

Crime council honors five

Leon Vaughn, former chairman of the Institutional Industries Advisories Board, part of the state Corrections Department, is among five people to be honored by the Washington Council on Crime and Delinquency at its annual meeting today.

Vaughn will receive an award for outstanding achievement as a citizen for his role in the development and promotion of court-ordered community service programs statewide, the council said.

In addition, he is being recognized for his service on the King County juvenile diversion advisory board and on the Black Prisoners Assistance Coalition.

Others receiving awards at the Rainier Bank Tower meeting to-

day include:

■ **Charles Dunsire**, editorial page editor of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, for outstanding achievement by a journalist.

The council said Dunsire has given high-quality coverage to criminal and juvenile justice issues and applauded him for the emphasis placed on justice and corrections issues in the P-I.

■ **State Sen. Phil Talmadge** for outstanding achievement as a public official because of his leadership on a broad spectrum of criminal and justice issues in the state Legislature.

The council said he was the driving force behind the child protection legislation and new crime victim legislation passed during the last legislative session.

■ **J. David Hawkins**, director

of the Center for Social Welfare Research at the University of Washington School of Social Work, for outstanding achievement as a scholar.

The council said the center contains one of the leading juvenile delinquency prevention programs in the nation and he is being honored for pioneering work in delinquency prevention as well as prevention of substance abuse.

■ **Warren Netherland**, past chairman of the Washington Council on Crime and Delinquency board of directors, will receive the organization's special service award for service to the council.

Netherland has served two terms as chairman of the board; and during that period, the council has experienced outstanding organizational change and growth, the council said.
